UAMS TOPS HALF A MILLION IN OCT. 2 DAY OF GIVING

Over a 24-hour period beginning early Oct. 2 and ending in the wee hours of Oct. 3, the foundation for UAMS received more than \$500,000 for the state's only health sciences university in response to the second annual UAMS Day of Giving fundraising campaign.

The grand total was more than \$549,000.

"Philanthropic support is critical to the UAMS mission, which includes everything from training tomorrow's health care providers to making groundbreaking scientific discoveries to providing the highest quality medical care. In these and many other ways, we work to improve health for all Arkansans," said UAMS Chancellor Cam Patterson, M.D., MBA. "It's both validating and humbling to see that so many of you believe in supporting this mission, and we could not be more thankful for

each donor. You are investing in a better future for our state."

Patterson kicked off the day's events by making its first official donation at 6 a.m., Oct. 2. He and his wife, Kristine B. Patterson, M.D., helped with many activities throughout the day, with one of the most popular events at the UAMS fountain taking selfies with the students.

The campaign, in its second year, surpassed its stated goal of \$400,000 before 5 p.m., said Amanda May, director of annual giving.

Donors made gifts via phone or online at the campaign website, **dayofgiving.uams.edu.** UAMS leadership and volunteers staffed tables around campus to receive in-person donations from anyone wishing to give to support their area of interest, including employees passing by on a morning walk or

TAKE THE TOBACCO PLEDGE BY NOV. 30

ALL employees who are covered under the University medical plan MUST complete a tobacco pledge by Nov. 30, 2018, OR they will be charged a \$50 monthly tobacco surcharge for 2019.

The pledge should be completed online via Employee Self Service. The pledge, which is now available, can be found in ESS under 2019 Benefits Open Enrollment. Upon completion of the pledge, you will receive a confirmation email. UAMS employees should NOT go to the UMR website to take this pledge.

If you **DO NOT** use tobacco products, you must complete the pledge by Nov. 30 and agree to continue to remain tobacco-free. Failure to complete the pledge will result in you being charged the monthly tobacco surcharge.

If you **DO** use tobacco products, you must complete the pledge by Nov. 30, including committing to enrolling in and completing a recognized tobacco cessation program in 2019, in order to avoid the surcharge. Many recognized tobacco cessation programs that provide services or one-on-one counseling are available at no cost to you. Failure to agree to smoking cessation efforts will result in you being charged the monthly tobacco surcharge.

UAMS HOLDS FIRST VISION 2029 TOWN HALL

UAMS held the first of five Vision 2029 Town Halls on Oct. 25 in the Wilson Education Building as employee input was sought for the institution's next long-range strategic plan. Nearly 100 employees answered questions about UAMS' strengths, weaknesses and major opportunities for growth in the next 10 years.

Led by Stephanie Gardner, Pharm.D., Ed.D., senior vice chancellor of academic affairs and provost, a Vision 2029 steering committee and the Office of Human Resources' Organizational Development team are guiding the process toward a plan that will follow the Vision 2020 initiative.

"Dr. Patterson tasked us with determining where UAMS needs to be in 10 years as well as where Arkansas needs UAMS to be in 10 years," said Gardner. "He wants the strategic plan to be both aspirational and realistic."

The strategic plan will encompass 2019-2029, concluding on the 150th anniversary of UAMS.

"It is only fitting that this plan will end in 2029 — a year in which UAMS will celebrate our history and look toward our future," said Gardner.

So far, more than 60 interviews and 20-plus focus groups have been conducted with employees, students, leaders in clinical, education and research programs, along with public stakeholders to gather data, which will then be analyzed and used to create the plan. A two-day retreat of 50 leaders is scheduled in December to review the data and develop an outline for the new plan. The goal is to unveil the plan next summer.

Mario Wallace, an HR senior consultant in Organizational Development, led the audience through a short survey in which employees used their cellphones to text their responses.

Thanks to the Poll Everywhere program, real-time data showed on a screen in the room, allowing attendees to see what their colleagues thought.

The second town hall was held Friday, Oct. 26, on the UAMS Northwest Regional Campus in Fayetteville. Three more town halls are scheduled for November. They are:

- Nov. 7 8-9 a.m., Spine Institute, 12th floor
- Nov. 8 noon-1 p.m., Rahn Building, Room 8240
- Nov. 9 noon-1 p.m., Hospital Lobby Gallery

"The goal of these town halls and interviews is to get feedback from all areas of the campus," said Becky Harwell, director of Organizational Development. "We want a strategic plan for all UAMS, and the only way we can effectively do that is with broad employee participation."



Get Your Flu Shot

Have you gotten your flu shot yet? Flu vaccinations are mandatory for all UAMS employees, students and volunteers.

The deadline to receive your vaccination is Nov. 14.

Employees, students and volunteers are encouraged to take advantage of the vaccination clinics. See http://go.uams.edu/flushot, as well as digital signs around campus, for a list of clinic dates and locations.

Compliance with the mandatory flu vaccine policy is a condition for employment at UAMS. However, a medical exemption or a religious exemption may be requested. It will be evaluated by Human Resources and/or Student & Employee Health Office on a case-bycase basis. The deadline for requesting an exemption is **Nov. 14.**
