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## UAMS to Host 28<sup>th</sup> Annual Diabetes Update Symposium for Health care Professionals Nov. 17-18

LITTLE ROCK — The University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS) is hosting the 28<sup>th</sup> Annual Diabetes Update Symposium Nov. 17-18 for health care professionals who work with patients to prevent, diagnose and treat diabetes.

The symposium is a unique, interactive, interprofessional event that can be attended in person this year for the first time since 2019. It may also be attended virtually.

It will highlight important practice-changing updates and best-practice strategies for improving patient care, including the use of communication tools to improve patients' adherence to care regimens.

The conference will be held from noon to 5 p.m. Friday, Nov. 17 and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 18 in the Fred Smith Auditorium on the 12<sup>th</sup> floor of the Jackson T. Stephens Spine & Neurosciences Institute. Parking is available in Parking Deck 3 at the corner of UAMS Boulevard and Capitol Avenue.

For those who want to participate virtually, a Zoom link will be sent to registrants a day before the conference begins.

Featured speakers will be Don Murchow, a Type 1 diabetic who is an ultramarathoner, triathlete and an Ironman; Robyn Stuhr, an exercise physiologist who will discuss physical activity and diabetes; and Patricia Daiker, RN, who has Type 1 diabetes and is an advocate for providing crucial support and service to people experiencing diabetes-related burnout.

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Presentations will also feature the use of plain language to improve communication with patients, updates on continuous glucose monitor technology, cardiometabolic heart failure, prescribing diabetes medications, diabetes and cognitive decline, GLP-1 use for T2DM and weight loss, and other topics.
